A decade of suicides, homicides and homicide-suicides in Trumbull County, Ohio were examined in order to understand the social factors that influence these tragic deaths and their relationship to another form of violence: domestic violence. The impetus for this study was a common concern among agencies and front-line professionals (such as victim advocates, mental health care providers, emergency room nurses, the forensic pathologist, death investigators, and the Trumbull County Domestic Violence Task Force) that these deaths are related to other patterns of violence that may be preventable. Understanding the linkages to domestic violence may offer agencies and other professionals information to create tools and build strategies for effective intervention, especially among those who often see patients/clients in the months leading up to (a) fatality(ies). This presentation will share results from this study and discuss the implications of "where do we go from here" in terms of reducing fatal violence in our community.
